


## What is PBIS?

PBIS is a multi-tiered system of supports to create and maintain positive school climates where teachers can teach and students can learn. This evidence-based framework emphasizes the prevention of behavioral and school discipline problems by teaching, modeling and recognizing positive, appropriate behavior in schools. PBIS is not a curriculum, program, or single practice, but is a systems framework that guides the selection and implementation of evidence-based practices for improving behavioral and social-emotional outcomes for all students while increasing opportunities for academic engagement and improved performance.

*“Integrating Trauma Sensitivity and Social Emotional Learning through the Framework of PBIS, a Multi-Tiered System of Support”*




The New York State Education Department is pleased to announce regional professional development workshops designed to inform schools about how to create environments that promote healthy student outcomes by braiding social emotional learning and trauma sensitive practices into a multi-tiered system of support.

## Session Overview

Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) is a Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS) that supports all students in the social and behavioral domains. Due to the various and challenging needs of today's student population, schools have begun to focus on how trauma impacts student functioning and how important social emotional learning (SEL) is to assisting students with being successful. In this session, participants will learn how trauma affects an individual and strategies that can be incorporated into a PBIS/MTSS framework to increase sensitivity to these needs. In addition, the session will provide an overview of SEL and an instructional framework that schools can utilize to address student's emotional learning needs. Using student vignettes that are specific to the grade level they are currently working with (i.e., preschool, elementary, secondary); participants will have the opportunity to apply the principles of trauma sensitivity and social emotional learning, utilizing a PBIS/MTSS framework to provide efficient and effective supports.

## Key Points

The key concepts to be covered during these sessions include:

- ⇒ Recognizing how trauma impacts a student in the academic, social, and behavioral domains,
- ⇒ Establishing a trauma sensitive lens to shift perspectives on students with challenging behavior and develop need based interventions,
- ⇒ Developing a context for the implementation of SEL to assist students with learning skills in all five social domains; and
- ⇒ Making connections between data, systems, and practices that can be utilized to braid PBIS/MTSS with trauma sensitive practices, and SEL to increase student social and academic engagement.

## Who should participate?

School administrators, general and special education teachers, teaching assistants, counselors and social workers. This training will be beneficial for PBIS team members at the Universal, Targeted, and Intensive levels. This professional development is open to all districts/schools in the region at no cost, on a first come, first served basis.
