



**Computer Recycling for Education and Technology Enhancement**

July 2014

**CREATE Annual Report  
July 1, 2013-June 30, 2014**

The Computer Recycling for Education and Technology Enhancement (CREATE) Act became a law on July 2, 1996. The law was passed to promote computer literacy in order to produce a competitive workforce. A policy was created that surplus computer equipment, owned by the State, that may be of use in the educational system shall be made available to the educational institutions that may require the equipment.

The Commissioner of Education was instructed to establish guidelines governing the distribution of State owned surplus computer equipment to public schools, the Office of Children and Family Services, and public libraries. Other eligible applicants include public and private institutions for education and not-for-profit institutions serving individuals with disabilities, low-income individuals or senior citizens.



During the 2013-2014 school year, 2,228 computers were donated to 42 different school districts and educational entities for their educational programs. The list of donors included the New York State Environmental Facilities Corporation, Unified Court System, SUC Oneonta, New York State Energy Research and Development Authority, New York State Thruway Authority, New York State Higher Education Services Corporation, New York State Office of Mental Health, New York State Developmental Disabilities Planning Council, and the New York State Education Department.

Equipment continues to reach resource lean programs operated by high-need school districts. The need/resource capacity index, a measure of a district's ability to meet the needs of its students with local resources, is the ratio of the estimated poverty percentage to the Combined Wealth Ratio. A district with both estimated poverty and Combined Wealth Ratio equal to the State average would have a need/resource capacity index of 1.0.

The following chart and table provides information as to the agencies that received donations.

The number of computers disseminated for the last five years is recorded in the following table:

Efforts are made to ensure that high quality performance computers are available for the entities receiving equipment. For the 2013-14 school year, approximately 92% of the computers were rated at Pentium 2.0 GHz or better. The majority of the equipment below this threshold was laptops, which are in high demand. Also in high demand were flat panel monitors and laser printers which were donated thru CREATE and are not reflected in the report.
