The District completed a Capital Project improvement plan. Part of this plan included replacing old network infrastructure equipment and installing new wireless access points throughout our district. We now have access points in our classrooms and shared spaces and the infrastructure to support our 1:1 device program. As our needs change, we plan to purchase more bandwidth from BOCES to accommodate those needs. The access points we have installed support 802.11ac which is capable of over 1 GB speeds, if necessary.

The Chromebooks we intend to continue to purchase through our Smart Schools Investment Plan are compatible with our existing infrastructure. Through Capital Project improvements, we've included plans to address the electric, network, and other infrastructure to support our needs for new classroom technology. We have electrical power available for Chromebook charging stations and carts. We also have HVAC units installed to maintain proper temperatures on our new servers and switches obtained through the Capital Project.

This plan aims to improve differentiated instruction by providing students with more personalized learning opportunities. Teachers have opportunities to assign scaffolded assignments to students based on their level of understanding using these devices. These devices have been used to address all learning modalities (visual, auditory, tactile, kinesthetic) while providing students with the convenience of learning at their own pace, when possible.

In addition, these devices will continue to enable students to be more collaborative inside and outside of the classroom, consistent with our New Paltz vision and District Technology Plan. They provide access to the Internet and a variety of resources while also promoting collaboration among students on digital projects and the ability to publish to a wider audience. Authentic learning assignments will support student achievement and help them develop as citizens of the world, passionate about learning, and empowered learners. Furthermore, the Chromebooks will help us provide additional support to all students including those with disabilities and English language learners, aligned with our District Technology Plan. These devices offer accessibility options like a screen magnifier, speech-to-text, text-to-speech, and several other useful tools for our students with disabilities. In addition to those resources, our English language learners can use the translation features on these devices to support their process of learning a new language. Our teachers will also use these devices to offer translated documents to their ELLs and can use it to help them communicate with these students. Finally, this plan will address learning gaps identified within our classrooms. For example, implementing a universal screener on devices like Chromebooks will enable us to efficiently collect and analyze data on student performance. This data, along with other digital formative and summative assessments, will inform instruction by allowing teachers to quickly identify and address learning gaps. Based on the insights gained from digital assessments, we will introduce additional tools for academic interventions. The further integration of these devices will reduce learning gaps by providing personalized learning experiences, increasing engagement, facilitating access to a wide range of resources, and supporting data-driven instruction. This approach will ensure that all students have the opportunity to succeed academically.

The proposed plan will enhance ongoing communication with parents and other stakeholders through the access to additional devices for all students and teachers. Teachers will use the devices to communicate with parents/guardians through Google Apps, PowerSchool Parent Portal, our website and other tools to inform them of their child's progress in school. These devices will also allow students to publish their work to a wider audience and connect with their community.

Since our first Smart Schools proposal, we have successfully completed our transition to Google Apps for Education. We will continue to plan professional development to improve our staff competence in the following areas:

- Using Google Classroom to promote college and career readiness and extend learning outside of the classroom.
- Research, writing, and technology in a digital world.
- Differentiated student assessment through technology.
- Assistive technology strategies for students with disabilities.
- Integrating technology in the curriculum.
- Project-based and Inquiry-based learning using technology.
- Supporting ELLs through the use of technology.
- Promoting digital citizenship and a positive digital footprint.

These areas and several others will be the focus of our professional development approach for this plan. These sessions/workshops will be facilitated by the district's technology department, library media specialists, integrated technology teachers, and other staff members. In addition to those topics, we will focus on implementing professional development on using the Chromebooks and 1:1 strategies for differentiation/enrichment, students with disabilities, ELLs, and engaging students for staff. We also have been developing professional development on effective use of artificial intelligence for both staff and secondary students.
